#### **ACCREDITATION**

National accreditation is validation that a public health department is capable of providing public health services at an appropriate scale for its community and has the capability to help improve population health.

Ohio was the first state to mandate that all health departments reach accredited status (ORC 3701.342). As of December 2023, 89 of Ohio's 113 health departments have been accredited.

#### Next Steps:

- On March 12, 2024, the PHAB Accreditation Committee will meet to discuss and determine the LCHD's accreditation status.
- Approximately 2 weeks following that meeting, PHAB will inform the LCHD of their decision about accreditation

# CHNA/CHIP/STRATEGIC PLAN

In 2022, LCHD participated in a Community Health Needs Assessment, led by KDMC. In the spring of 2023, several SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analyses were conducted with community partners, and a Lawrence County Community Health Assessment was completed. The Community Health Improvement Plan is in progress. When it is finalized, we will finish writing the strategic plan, and a copy of each will be provided to you upon completion.

# **Certified Tobacco Treatment Specialists**

In October 2023, the Director of Nursing, Health Planner, and Health Educator became nationally Certified Tobacco Treatment Specialists. The goal is to help those who wish to become tobacco-free. The DON's focus will be adults, while the Health Planner and Health Educator will work with youth.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH**

Four of our Environmental Health Team are now certified pool operators. Under the ORC, pool inspections are a mandated function of the health department, and this will ensure we're following ORC and ODH standards when inspecting recreational water (pools, spas, and special use).

Garrett Carpenter took, and passed, a test to become a Registered Environmental Health Specialist (REHS). He has to complete his 2 years as EHSIT before he is licensed as REHS.

# School Tobacco Policy Change Advocacy:

- New initiative in 2023
- Area partners in collaboration with the LCHD for this initiative:
  - o Impact Prevention
  - Lawrence County Educational Service Center
  - LC Court of Common Pleas' Probate and Juvenile Division
  - o LC School Resource Officer
  - Department of Job and Family Services Children Services

- LCHD collaborates and meets regularly with our area partners to educate and promote best practices for school tobacco policy to stakeholders throughout Lawrence County

To date, 2 of the school districts have already made, or are actively planning to make, changes to the school tobacco policy in alignment with best practices

Linkage to Tobacco Cessation for Youth:

- New initiative in 2023
- Both the LCHD Health Planner and Health Educator have been trained and are now Certified Tobacco Treatment Specialists (CTTS) through The Breathing Association
- The LCHD Health Planner and Health Educator have been trained and are now Certified Facilitators in INDEPTH (Intervention for Nicotine Dependence: Education, Prevention, Tobacco, and Health, an intensive intervention program for youth) through the American Lung Association
- The LCHD Health Planner and Health Educator have been trained and are now Certified Facilitators in N-O-T (Not On Tobacco, a tobacco cessation program for youth) through the American Lung Association
- Linkage to cessation program currently under development, in collaboration with LC ESC

# **Obesity Program**

The LCHD was awarded funding in March 2023 from the Pallottine Foundation for the purpose of laying a strong foundation for an adult obesity prevention program. Since that time, the LCHD has garnered support from several area partners for this upcoming program. Area partners have offered their subject matter expertise as we created a comprehensive community health needs assessment specific to obesity. Survey Monkey software and gasoline gift cards were purchased in support of the survey rollout to happen in January 2024. Results of this survey will be tabulated in late March of 2024 and will inform us

as we develop an adult obesity program that will address the unique needs of our Lawrence County community.

#### **Preconception Health**

The LCHD received funding from the Ohio Department of Health for services promoting the overall health of maternal aged women. With the awarded funding, we have achieved:




#### **Dental Sealant Program**


The Lawrence County Dental Sealant Program is an Ohio Department of Health program to place dental sealants on the molar teeth of children in 2nd and 6th grades in the 15 elementary and middle public schools in Lawrence County with a follow-up check in the 3rd and 7th grades. The purpose of the program is to apply high quality dental sealants to the teeth of high-risk students that meet the ODH criteria of 40% or more enrolled in the Free and Reduced-Price Meal Program (FRPMP). Since the COVID outbreak our number of students sealed, and teeth sealed has dropped but continues to rise since 2022. In 2023, the program sealed 737 students with 333 more that were assessed but did not need to be sealed. The number of newly sealed teeth was 1083, with an additional 386 teeth that were partially or completely resealed.





#### PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) came about because of the events of 9/11 and subsequent anthrax attacks. Prior to these events there were not many public health preparedness activities. Originally called the Public Health Infrastructure Grant, LCHD has been a recipient of the Public Health Emergency Preparedness grant since 2002.

The Emergency Response Coordinator works with the Regional PHEP Coordinator and ERCs from our 10-county region to ensure the capabilities that serve as national standards for public health preparedness planning are met. Deliverables are completed and submitted to ODH through the Grants Management Information System. Deliverables include training and exercise, education, and updating emergency response plans. To meet those deliverables in 2023, the ERC attended monthly meetings drills and exercises, updated the Emergency Response Plan (base plan, annexes, and appendices).
